



# Borough Commitment to Preserving Open Space and Sustainability

- Establishment of Environmental and Beautification Committee
- Establishment of Borough Green Team
  - Certified Bronze 2013
  - Re-certified Bronze 2016
- Redevelopment planning includes dedicated open space
  - 2.0 acre park (2018)
  - 0.25 acre park I (2017)
  - 0.25 acre park II (2017)
- Family donation
  - 1.1 acres for public use (closing expected 2016)



#### Officials hope to bring community garden to borough

The Sustainable Jersey program rewards municipalities for their commitment to sustainability and every year, doles out grants of up to \$25,000 for its members to pursue projects that improve the qual-

ity of life.

More than 100 towns have used the funds to launch school food composting programs, con-struct rain gardens, install electric vehicle charging

The borough believes its community garden

would make a worthy addition to the mix.

Not only would it inch Fort Lee closer to "silver certification status but it would also "serve as a source of pride" for the entire town and benefit resdents both young and old, according to the bor

ough's grant proposal.
"I want community outreach," said Councilwoman lla Kasofsky, who led the borough's four-year effort to earn Sustainable Jersey certification and is now in charge of the community garden

That outreach would extend from the schools to the borough's two senior citizen and low-income

housing complexes, she said.

Kasofsky hopes to see students using the plots as "open classrooms," tending to its contents and then donating the resulting fruits and vegetables to the

The plots, to be located between the Fort Lee Dog Park and the Recreation Center's ten-

nis courts, will likely be divided among different schools and com-

munity groups, said Kasofsky.
"It's going to be a great joint venture," she said. It will also show community nvolvement at its best.

"I can't think of anyone that [would be] omitted," said Kasof-"Anyone can volunteer. I can't wait to get it going."

### Let's Get the Garden Growing!

Councilwoman Kasofsky developed a "Garden Application" and "Agreement of Responsibility" form.

We received sixty (60) applications for space and twenty (20) memberships were granted to individual families, senior citizens, and students.

#### Agreement of Responsibility

To participate in the Fort Lee Community Garden, I understand and agree to the following policies and responsibilities:

- 1. The garden plots will be assigned starting April 20th, and I can begin planting by May 15th. It is a first come first serve basis.
- 2. I/We will maintain our garden plot through the end of the growing season and will have my plot cleared of debris by November 1.
- 3. I won't plant tall crops where they will shade neighboring plots.
- 4. I will pick only my crops unless given permission by another plot user.
- 5. I will NOT use fertilizers, insecticides or weed repellents that will in any way affect other plots.
- 6. I will NOT bring pets to the garden area.
- 7. There will be NO fencing or manmade structures other than plant supports and a sign identifying the gardeners plot name. ID Signs can be no larger than 12 X 24 on a 36" stake. Naming your garden and creative signage is encouraged.
- 8. If I must abandon my plot for any reason, I will notify the garden leadership.
- 9. I will keep trash and litter out of the plot and will participate in the fall cleanup of the garden.
- 10. I/We understand that the GREEN sponsors are providing the community gardens as a benefit to the residents of Fort Lee on a not for profit volunteer organization basis. I will not hold the land owner or any GREEN partner responsible for my actions. I THEREFORE AGREE TO HOLD HARLMESS THE GARDEN GROUP AND OWNERS OT THE LAND FOR ANY LIABILITY, DAMAGE, LOSS OR CLAIM THAT OCCURS IN CONNECTION WITH USE OF THE GREEN GARDEN BY ME OR ANY OF MY GUESTS.

#### **How Did Our Garden Grow?**

#### Fort Lee Department of Public Works

- Cleared and leveled an area 35 x 90 feet
- Installed and compacted decorative stone as ground surface
- Paved first eight (8') feet of garden area for accessibility
- For 2014, installed 20 3-ft diameter donated plastic pots
- For 2015, constructed eight (8) wooden raised beds 4 ft x 8 ft
- Installed two (2) park benches

#### Outside contractors

- Installed new perimeter fencing and gate
- Installed dedicated water service
- Installed dedicated sprinklers for each planter





### **Growing Successes from Our Garden!**


- Provided opportunity for almost 100 individuals to enjoy growing their own fruits, vegetables, flowers and herbs
