Balloon Ordinance

Proposed Ordinance for Margate City, NJ

"The intentional releasing of helium balloons including the atmosphere is prohibited under Marga

Release of balloons

(1) Margate finds that the release into the atmosphere of ball than-air gases pose a danger and nuisance to the environment and marine animals.

(2) It is unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to inte the release, or intentionally cause to be released balloons in lighter than air except for:

(a) Balloons released by a person on behalf of a gov to a governmental contract for scientific or meteor purposes;

(b) Hot air balloons that are recovered after laune

(c) Balloons released indoors

(3) Any person found in violation is guilty of a noncriminal infraction, punishable by a fine of \$500.

Monarchs rule

Monarch butterflies, with their easily recognized black-and-orange wing pattern, are preparing for their seasonal migration. These delicate yet durable insects will average a flight speed of 5.2 mph, flying hundreds of miles to their winter home, which could be as far away as Mexico.

Unfortunately, these butterflies that were very plentiful are in serious decline and their existence is hreatened. One reason is he loss of their winter habat in Mexico and loss of reeding areas in North
