Event coordinators, group leaders, educators, volunteers and media reps use this website to promote their events in order to attract volunteers, participants and media reps to them.

Each year the Earth Day - New Jersey website receives more than 50,000 hits in April through May because it features an [Events Calendar](#) that lists between as many as 100 or more public events, including fairs, cleanups, plantings, festivals, walks and outdoor programs.

The Earth Day – New Jersey website also features a school programs listing, history of Earth Day and Environmental Education Week, and suggestions for what families, schools and individuals can do to help protect the environment.
