Animals in the Community

Animals in the Community Education *Retired 12/31/23*

10 Points

Program Summary: Education about animals, their habitats, and their connection to humans promotes and empowers responsible community stewardship of New Jersey's wild and domestic animals and of our shared environment. Humane education programs help to teach students, residents, and other stakeholders in the community about the interactions between humans and wildlife as well as about responsible pet ownership, which includes not only caring for pets, but

also how pets are allowed to interact with society and the natural environment. Through such education, municipalities can promote positive interactions between community members, both human and animal, and improve stewardship of the natural environment. Under N.J.S.A. 4:19-15.16b Irvington Health Department have a full time certified Animal Control Officer ACO to enforce the provisions of N.J.S.A. 4:19-15.16. ACOs authorized by the municipal government to enforce the New Jersey animal cruelty laws (N.J.S.A 4:22) ACO always timely response to calls and complaints from the public concerning lost, stray, injured, or nuisance domestic animals; also concerning suspect rabid wild or domestic animals and vicious dogs. The response to animalrelated emergency calls is rapid to control dangerous animals and minimize pain and suffering of sick and injured animals (N.J.S.A. 4:19-15.16). He investigates of reports of animal bite and vicious dog incidents, seizure and impoundment of dogs meeting criteria under the State vicious dog law, and notifying health officers and municipal courts. (N.J.S.A. 4:19-19). He canvasses for unlicensed dogs (and cats as required by local ordinance) and take enforcement action when necessary (N.J.S.A. 4:19-15.15). He provides public education for schools, the media and other groups regarding topics such as responsible pet ownership, rabies prevention, and the need for spaying and neutering of pets. Canvass for unlicensed dogs & cats and take enforcement action when necessary (N.J.S.A. 4:19-15.15). Irvington Health Department organizes once a month a health fair under the health observance day calendar where ACO always provided the literature to the participants about animal care and responsible ownership. ACO also provided the educational literature regarding the animal care to the students at their career fair and other events. Animal Control Officers also provide literature to senior's citizens and other community members during health fairs all year around. We also have a display racks at Health Department where we provide the public health educational literature including animal care literature. Lead Education & Outreach Programs

10 Points

Program Summary: Irvington Health Department is a grantee for Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (CLPPP) from NJDOH. We carry out a Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention (CLPP) Program, provide nurse case management services and provide environmental investigations per N.J.A.C. 8:51 and protocols and procedures established by the New Jersey Department of Health (NJ DOH) for all children in the Township of Irvington with confirmed blood lead levels 15 ug/dL or higher or two consecutive tests between 10 and 14 ug/dL that are at least between one month to three months apart. As of today Irvington CLPPP has about 129 active case load to follow up for nurse case management services and about 119 environmental investigations per N.J.A.C. 8:51. Build capacity and competency of environmental inspectors and nurse case managers to incorporate Healthy Homes approach when providing services to lead poisoned children. Our Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (CLPPP) Team members provide lead prevention literature to the families of the high lead levels as well as the other community members. In partnership with Irvington Family Development located at 50 Union Ave, Irvington, NJ we provided needed assistance to our residents. Community Gardens

Program Summary: Over the past 2.5 years, the township - with guidance from current green team members - has helped to establish and subsequently support various community and school gardens throughout Irvington. The first of these gardens was established in our East Ward and is overseen by the East Ward Joint Block Association along with the Rutgers Cooperative Extension, Irvington Councilman Paul Inman, and the community. This particular garden runs a number of programs benefiting many residents in the East Ward. In addition to the gardens that have been functioning successfully for the past two years, the green team recently cut the ribbon on a brand new garden at the Florence Avenue School, to be overseen by the school principal, maintained by school maintenance staff, Student council and the Irvington Green Team volunteers, supported by the master gardener from Rutgers University to serve the community in the west ward of Irvington. We are continuously assessing new sites to encourage formation of new gardens.

Green Building Policy/Resolution

Program Summary: Irvington Green Team understands the importance of adopting Green building resolution as it demonstrates the Township's commitment to environmental, economic, and social stewardship practices. By adopting this resolution, we will reduce operating costs, provide healthy work environments for staff and residents, and demonstrate municipal leadership. Irvington Township is already taking steps toward these objectives by completing our energy efficiency audit of facilities owned and operated by our township, creating an active Green Team, and so forth. Once adopted, the Resolution was sent to Zoning and Planning Board, The Environmental commission, the Irvington Green Team, the township engineer, and construction code official to consider the green building practices during their decision making processes.

Program Summary: Members of the current green team and the Irvington Health Department established the Irvington Mayor's Wellness Campaign. The Campaign has extended through to the current day and includes numerous ongoing programs that facilitate and promote community health and wellness. These include the following: * Irvington Play Streets program...3-4 events per year engaging both the community and the township employees to participate in town-sponsored games and other physical activities * Local Bodegas Healthy Choices - healthy food racks established at local corner stores through public/private partnership * Irvington Schools Pedestrian Safety Study - planned study that will map walking routes for students at two local public schools * Irvington Walking Club - Hundreds of residents and township employees are gathering regularly to walk a number of routes laid out on and mapped thanks to township resources * Community Garden initiative - numerous school and community gardens established in numerous neighborhoods throughout the township. Township employees and the community worked together for successful gardens Over the course of the past several years, the township has solicited participation, technical assistance, and other resources from numerous entities to support these programs and more are added to the docket all the time. These sources include the NJ Department of Health (Shaping New Jersey), Sustainable Jersey, township employees, nonprofit organization such as neighborhood health, local businesses, Rutgers University, and the Irvington Board of Education.

Prescription Drug Safety & Disposal

Program Summary: Irvington township received information below on having a permanent prescription drugs Dropbox at the police department located at 1 civic square in Irvington, NI 07111. The Irvington green team is working with the Irvington administration, the Essex county and ADAPT to have this implemented in the near future. This sustainable priority action is needed and we are confident that we can implement it. In the meantime, we collaborate with UMDNJ University Hospital Environmental Services located at 150 Bergen St, Newark NJ 07103 and educate our Township residents to drop their medical syringes. Below is the information about the dropbox program that we do through our Municipal Alliances and ADAPT. Four towns in Essex (Millburn, Belleville, North Caldwell and Livingston) already have these boxes. If there are questions the township may have you should call Joel Torres at ADAPT 973-323-3907 and he will work with you to set up the program in Irvington. Prescription Medication Permanent Disposal Drop Boxes: ADAPT provides the funding to place permanent disposal boxes for unused, outdated, discontinued prescription medication within local police departments. The local police department is the only authorized location allowed by the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA). Local students, along with their high school art teacher or a local art organization, design the box to give it a local feel. The box does not require anyone to physically monitor it 24 hours per day, 7 days a week. There just needs to be video surveillance in the area where it is kept. Millburn and Livingston have a process for storing and disposing of the RX meds. They put a cardboard box inside the dropbox compartment. When it fills up, they take it out and put it in their evidence locker and replace it with another cardboard box, etc. etc. When they see that the locker is reaching capacity, they weigh it (for reporting purposes) and go to dispose it. Based on the experiences of Millburn, it would only be once a quarter that the meds would need to be disposed. Millburn and Livingston use Covanta Energy for the disposal because this is the company that does all the disposal services for the town. Therefore, if a municipality uses another company, it would just require having a conversation with the company to allow disposal of the meds. There is no extra charge to the municipality for the service. The Police Chief would need to send a waiver request to the DEA to host the dropbox in their department. ADAPT has a draft letter already created for this purpose. The department would need to send ADAPT a report each time they disposed of the medication. It is nothing intricate, just a simple email. Millburn sends an email stating the date of disposal and the pounds of meds disposed. ADAPT collaborates with Municipal Alliances to do presurveys to assess the knowledge of the local community as it pertains to monitoring, securing and disposing of their prescription medication. ADAPT uses this data to help our environmental strategies in this area. ADAPT also shares this information with the local partners so they may adjust their programmatic approaches related to prescription abuse/misuse, heroin. Etc.
